They Came To Memorialize Former Soccer Player

LANGDON, NH--A brightly lit near full moon; a shooting star; a maple leaf with a heart unexplainably cut out; an outpouring of former teammates and newly acquired friends; victory on the soccer field by both the boys and girls varsity teams. Put them all together and you have the recipe for warmth on an otherwise chilly Friday evening at Fall Mountain Regional High School in Langdon, NH.

"My heart is overwhelmed!," said Charlestown's Marty Lessard following the girls game, a 4-1 triumph over Conant.

Lessard and her husband, Mike, admittedly could not remember when they were both last at a high school soccer contest. But this one was a special night. Mike and Marty Lessard had reserved seats, thanks to the generous contribution of many administrators, coaches, players, and friends who all banded together to pay homage to Michelle Tanguay.

Tanguay, the former Michelle Lessard, left this earth September 18 succumbing to a four-and-a-half year battle against ovarian cancer. She had been a fixture in her early years developing soccer skills in the Claremont Youth Soccer League before shining on the field at Fall Mountain, graduating in 1992. She went on to play the sport at at Russell Sage College in Troy, NY, earning a degree in physical therapy. A brochure given to the many faithful who went to her funeral service in Concord stated, "Michelle was a firm believer in 'paying it for-

ward' and she would love to know that those she touched are carrying on the love, caring and encouragement that she tried to show."

Bolstered by former teammates Emily Esslinger and Meredith Piletz, boys coach Tim St.Pierre and girls coach Bruce Ferland, and Fall Mountain Athletic Director Gordon Dansereau, Friday evening was a tremendous success in that Michelle's parents, along with her husband, William, and 13-year-old twin daughters, Morgan and Rhiley, got to see first-hand what Michelle meant to those she came in contact with throughout her life. "I'm not surprised at what I've

seen," exclaimed Bill Tanguay following the ceremonies at the John Cooper Hubbard Athletic Field. "I'm learning more and more about the love Michelle showed to people. She was such an example of love. All this here tonight has been wonderful in a great way."

"I'm just a parent, I'm not pushing anything. I can't point out just one person who is responsible for all this," said Michelle's father earlier in the day. "I'm taking a back seat and letting them do what they want," he stated, tears welling up when trying to get a grasp on what would be taking place later in the day.





Sarah Sylvester Bast, who gave an emotional speech at the funeral service weeks earlier, drove all the way from just outside Boston to attend Friday night's tribute to her former Fall Mountain teammate, both members of Don Hart's 1991 squad. "Michelle was everything I wanted to grow up to be," Bast reported. "She was beautiful, talented and athletic, and had a wonderful smile. She was two years older than I was and she set a good example. I think it is important to show my children what it means to have a good family, to (Continued on page B2)

see what love is all about, and sticking together all you can." Bast was set to return to Massachusetts following the events since her daughter had a 9 a.m.soccer game Saturday morning.

Another close friend of the Tanguay's and Lessard's is Paula Dill, who organized a "Cocktails for a Cause" gettogether earlier in the summer, which made close to \$5,000, to help pay for weekly trips to Pennsylvania for Michelle and an accompanying adult for medical care in the hopes of stemming her condition and prolonging her time. Dill has a freshman on the Bishop Brady High school soccer

team and helped the two schools join in unison for the worthy cause knowing Michelle's connection with the Concord-based school.

Third-year Bishop Brady High School Athletic Director Andy Lathrop, in a phone conversation, reported, "When Gordon (Dansereau) called and told me what was planned I was more than willing to do our part," he stated. "It was the least we could do for a grieving community." Bishop Brady played the boys game wearing teal socks. Both the Fall Mountain teams, boys and girls, wore teal jerseys for ovarian cancer awareness.

Following the boys 2-0 win against Bishop Brady and prior to the girls game versus Conant both the boys and girls Fall Mountain squads paraded a banner in mid-field honoring Michelle and personally handed out soccer equipment to the motherless twin girls.

Also in attendance at the games were former Claremont Youth Soccer League coaches Phil

St.Pierre and Don Davis, both familiar to Michelle's prowess on the soccer field.
St.Pierre coached Lessard on the Cosmos and watched her develop her skills from the time she was a seven year old girl.

"All the kids liked her,"

St.Pierre quipped. "She had the skills, She could shoot, pass, and had good footwork. She had all the tools, and she always had that smile and carried it with her wherever she went."

The Tanguays live in Boscowen. Bill works for New Hampshire Management and Resources in Concord and the two girls play soccer in the Merrimack Valley program. Mike and Marty are native Claremonters, now living in Charlestown. Mike is a 1966 graduate of Stevens High, served his country while in the United States Air Force (1967-1971), and has been a steady influence at A and A.J. Hutcheon's on Pleasant Street in Claremont since 1973. Marty has just retired having spent the last 11-plus years at Whelen Engineering in Charlestown.

"I know Michelle is up there looking down," Mike said at evening's end Friday, once again wiping tears away.




SHS Field Hockey Finishes Season At 10-4

Scott is known for his thorough attention to facts as well as his dedication to finding the truth, whatever that may be, and these are just a few of the qualities that separate him from many others in his field.


His latest books, Cryptid Creatures of Florida and Weird Monsters, are two completely different types of books. Cryptid Creatures of Florida focuses on x-creatures that are found in the state of Florida. Florida is unique in that it possesses many varieties of unknown species that are reported each year. The opinion is often that these creatures are only reported by rednecks with a bit too much to drink or people with something to gain by making up a tall tale, however that is simply not the case. Mr. Marlowe points out that many witnesses to the unknown species in Florida, and in fact around the world, are quite reputable. Some even have a great deal to lose by coming forward.


Scott's second book that I am covering today, Weird Monsters, is very different from the first one mentioned. This book takes actual accounts and fictionalizes them for a reading experience that is more like you are sitting down and reading a short novel or a collection of short stories. So, while you're learning a bit about x-creatures, you're doing so in a way that sparks your imagination toward the fictional rather than the unidentified. This book is a fantastic read that takes its reader on multiple journeys to encounter such x-creatures as a werewolf, a lizard man, and more. It's great for both young readers and adults.
