SHS Baseball Teams Close Out Regular Season

The Stevens baseball teams closed out their regular season with 3 games each. The varsity took on Kearsarge, Newfound, and Fall Mountain, while the JV team traveled to Newfound for a pair of games, and hosted Fall Mountain.

On Monday afternoon, the varsity boys took to the road to play the Kearsarge Cougars. The Cardinals were trailing 5-4 going to the fifth inning but Stevens would take the lead for good with 4 runs in the inning. The big hits were a 2 run double off the bat of Derrick Stanhope. Trey Theriault added an RBI single in the inning, as well. The Cardinals went on to an 8-6 win. Stanhope recorded the win battling through 5 innings, before Drew Grenier came on to pitch the final two innings for his first save of the season. Grenier also added a hit and scored 3 times in the game. Stanhope had 2 hits in the contest. Alex Taylor had a hit and an RBI. Brendan Bean and Aidan Cahill also had an RBI each.

On Wednesday evening at Barnes Park, the team recognized their 4 seniors, Drew Grenier, Aidan Cahill, James Aiken, and Brendan Bean for their hard work and dedication to the program over their 4 years at Stevens. Things did not look good for Stevens and a happy ending on Senior Night, as Newfound jumped out to a quick 3-0 lead, and were still in front 5-4, when the Cardinals came to bat in the fifth inning. Stevens scored 3 times in the inning to take a 7-5 lead, capitalizing on a series of Newfound errors. The Cardinals broke the game

open in the sixth inning, scoring 4 times, with all the runs coming with two outs. The big hit in the inning was a bases loaded, bases clearing, double off the bat of Trey Theriault. Freshman Owen Taylor had the other RBI with a bases loaded walk. Josh Stithen came on to pitch the final 3 innings to pick up his 2nd win of the year. Stevens played one their better defensive games of the year, cutting down 2 Bear runners at third base, and 2 at home plate. Taylor threw out a Newfound base-runner from right field, after he tried to tag up on a fly out.

The Cardinals closed out the game in style as Derrick Stanhope caught a fly ball, and when the runner at third tried to tag up and score, he gunned a perfect one hop throw to Aidan Cahill at home for a game ending double play. Theriault had 2 hits and 4 RBI on the evening, while Tyler Bonneau reached base all 4 times, going 3 for 3 and getting hit by a pitch, with an RBI and scored a pair of runs.

Brendan Bean had an RBI and scored a pair of runs. Stanhope scored twice, and Josh Stithen had a big hit and 2 RBI.

On Friday night the Cardinals traveled to Hubbard Field in Walpole to take on the Wildcats of Fall Mountain, in the annual Ethan Kirby Cup game. The Wildcats regained the Cup after defeating the Cardinals 7-0. FM senior Kendal Heath was in complete charge for Fall Mountain. The big senior righty threw a complete game shutout, striking out 15 batters,

while not walking a single batter, and surrendering 5 hits. Brendan Bean had 2 of those hits. Alex Taylor, Josh Stithen, and Drew Grenier had the other hits for Stevens.

The Cardinals completed their season with a record of 10-7, good enough for the 9th seed in the upcoming NHIAA Division III tournament. The official pairings will be out on Tuesday morning, but it appears the Cardinals will be on the road to take on the 8th seeded Bishop Brady Green Giants, who concluded their season at 8-8.

The junior Cardinals made the trek to Bristol on Thursday afternoon for a twin bill with the Newfound Bears. Stevens returned home with a pair of wins, 10-1 in game one, and 10-5 in game two. The JV bats were blazing as they collected 15 hits on the day in the wins. Jarret LaPointe had 4 hits on the day, scored 5 runs, and had a pair of RBI. Matt Szelangowski had 3 hits and an RBI. Clayton Wadsworth had 2 hits and 5 RBI on the afternoon, Bryce Weymouth had his hitting streak stopped at 9 games in game two, but did have 2 hits on the day, and 3 RBI. Caden Ferland, and Karsten Kleyensteuber each had a hit and pair of RBI. Clayton Wadsworth tossed a complete game for the win in game one, while Gabe Miller picked up the win on the hill in the nightcap.

On Friday afternoon the JV team beat Fall Mountain 11-1. Owen Taylor was the star of the day, as he tossed a complete game for the win, going 6 innings, allowing 3 hits, striking out 8, walking one, and allowing just an earned run. The freshman lefty also had a huge day at the plate as he hit one out of Barnes Park, onto the road in right field, for his first home-run. He was 3 for 3 with 4 runs scored and had 3 RBI. Bryce Weymouth had 2 hits, 2 RBI, and scored a pair of runs. Gabe Miller and Jarret LaPointe each had a hit, an RBI, and scored 2 runs. Michael Gaspar had a hit and an RBI, as well.

The junior Cardinals ended their campaign with a record of 8-4.

Hiking Season Is Here! Get Your Hike Safe Card

CONCORD, NH—As you make plans throughout the summer to get outside to hike, bike, kayak, or climb, be sure you have your Hike Safe card.

Card sales provide important support for Fish and Game's search and rescue efforts. The card also exempts holders from certain liability for repaying search and rescue costs.

Voluntary Hike Safe Cards are \$25 for an individual, or \$35 for a family (parents and minor children), and are good through the end of the calendar year.

"Whatever outdoor activity you enjoy — hiking, biking, paddling, cross country skiing, or walking the nature trails in your town, the Hike Safe Card is your back-up plan for the great outdoors," said Fish and Game Law Enforcement Chief Colonel Kevin Jordan. "Buying a card is also a great way to help support Fish and Game's search and rescue activities."

Individuals who possess a valid New Hampshire hunting or fishing license, or a current registration for an off-highway recreational ve-

hicle, snowmobile, or boat, have the same benefits as those provided by the Hike Safe card.

Colonel Jordan also recommends hikers "hike smart" and carry the top 10 essentials:

- Map
- Compass
- Warm Clothing:
 - Sweater or Pile Jacket
 - Long Pants (wool or synthetic)
 - Hat (wool)
- Extra Food and Water
- Flashlight or Headlamp
- Matches/Firestarters
- First Aid Kit/Repair Kit
- Whistle
- Rain/Wind Jacket and Pants
- Pocket Knife

Make It a Land of Love

*This land is your land This land is my land.
From California to the New York island;
From the red wood forest to the Gulf Stream waters
This land was made for you and Me.*

Woody Guthrie wrote this remarkable song during the Dust Bowl days of the thirties when men and women like him were walking the highways, riding the trains and trying to make a living and many, I dare say, trying to find themselves. We think we've written those hard time into the history books and that they are a thing of the past. They are not.

Oh, the days of my sisters and me sitting on the porch step with one of the "hobos" who stopped by for a meal are gone. Mom would make them a hot meal if she had something ready to heat up, but she'd always make a sandwich, and one to go, a glass of milk, coffee and whatever we had, cookies, cake, boiled eggs. I'm sure now the house was marked. Sometimes the man would work in the garden or rake the leaves and sometimes, they'd just tell us stories. Looking back, I'm thinking that they were veterans who were unable, for whatever reason, to return to the work force.

I learned from these encounters how rich we were to have a family, love, warm meals and a roof over our head. I learned at that tender age to accept people as they are. We never learned the "stories" or circumstances that made these men homeless. We did learn to love them, to anticipate kindness from them and we were never disappointed.

Every year on Memorial Day, we made sure the flag was affixed to a pillar on the front porch, so that passers by would know that we, in our home, honored the men and women who gave their lives for our freedom. We also remembered the living who have returned to a country that didn't understand the trauma, physically and emotionally that so many have experienced in war. We tried to remember all the people, living and dead, who gave so much for us to have the freedoms that we take for granted.

Many of you, dear readers, know that I am a pacifist. I dislike violence of any sort, but please be clear that I recognize and honor all veterans. They have made this land our land, as Woody Guthrie said. What we must remember is that it is also their land. It is their land first because they gave so much for it - for us. Don't hesitate to show love for the men and women who have given all so that we can enjoy the land of the free. Make it their land. Make it your land. Make it a land of love. As Bishop Curry said at the wedding of Meghan and Prince Harry, talking about love and the power of love, "I'm talking about power. Real power. Power to change the world."

Let us use the power of love to make a change here in Claremont and around the world, so that the lives of all veterans are honored and so that as a people of Love, we can move forward and change the world!

And the king will answer them, 'I tell you the truth, just as you did it for one of the least of these brothers or sisters of mine, you did it for me.'

Participants may also join with others just before the evening program begins by bringing a "brown bag" dinner to eat, beginning at 5 PM.

Do you wish you had more opportunity to think and learn about race, race relations and the impact of racism? Do you sometimes feel uncomfortable in multiracial groups? What if you could increase your capacity to improve race relations, change the way we think about race, address systemic racism, and advance equitable outcomes in our community? Join others in a small group of 20 or so individuals to reflect, learn, and act to address racial bias and discrimination. Our ultimate goal is to continue to nourish a Claremont

community where everyone can reach their full potential.
