Thunder Silence Monarchs, 4-2

Thunder Push Monarchs To Brink, Lead 3-0 In Series

GLENS FALLS, NY--The Manchester Monarchs will need to dig themselves out of a 3-0 series deficit, as they dropped Game 3, 4-2, to the Adirondack Thunder on Saturday night at the Glens Falls Civic Center.

The Thunder jumped out to an early lead when Mitchell Heard scored his 2nd goal of the playoffs, :40 seconds into the game. Heard streaked down the right wing and sent a wrister past Monarchs goaltender, Colin Stevens, for the 1-0 Thunder lead.

The Monarchs tied things up when Maxim Kitsyn scored his 2nd goal of the playoffs at 9:51 of the first period. A clean face-off win by Derek Arnold came right to Kitsyn at the top of the left circle, and Kitsyn fired a wrister past Thunder goaltender, Ken Appleby, making the game, 1-1.

The Thunder regained the lead when Heard scored his second goal of the game at 13:59 of the opening period. Heard took a pass from Ben Johnson out of the left corner, and while

crossing the net and going to the ice, Heard slide the puck past Stevens, giving Adirondack the 2-1 lead.

Ryan Lomberg put the Thunder ahead by two goals when he netted his first tally of the playoffs on the power play. Lomberg was camped in front of Stevens, and after a scramble in front, Lomberg found the puck, and stuffed it past the Monarchs goaltender, for the 3-1 Thunder advantage.

The Monarchs cut the Thunder lead in half when Matt Fornataro scored his 1st goal of the playoffs at 10:31 of the third period while on the power play. Joey Diamond sent a cross-ice pass to Fornataro who was wide-open, and the captain sent home a snap shot past Appleby who was over-committed to Diamond on the left side of the net, bringing the score to 3-2.

The Thunder sealed the victory when Greg Wolfe scored an empty-netter with 15.2 seconds remaining in the third period.

The Monarchs look to extend the series Monday night (7 p.m.) when they play Game 4 from the Glens Falls Civic Center.


golfers. This fun scramble costs \$5 pp and includes a dinner after. A sign up sheet is posted at the club.

Springfield Wrestling Team Competes at VT State Championships

SPRINGFIELD, VT--They've trained hard for months, pushing through sweat, tears, and even a little blood -- all to increase their stamina, improve their skill,

and face down personal challenges. The 3rd - 6th grade wrestlers of the Springfield, VT, Wrestling Team recently wrapped up their tournament season by competing at the Vermont State Championship in Vergennes.

With his usual high energy, Devin Snide-Tufts worked hard against two tough opponents; newcomer Gabriel McNeil also went headto-head with two seasoned wrestlers -- both Springfield boys are to be commended for their excellent sportsmanship and great attitudes. Second-year wrestler Armando Stettner claimed a victory in his

first match, hitting some fast moves and showing determination to beat his opponent. After losing a second match to the tournament champ, Stettner's third match was lost by only one point.

John Jasinski, Jr - also in his second year of wrestling - won three of his impressive five matches with relentless determination, showing increased skill and lots of promise. Jasinski's work at practice paid off as he twisted, turned, rolled, and used his body's weight as leverage to hold his opponents' backs to the mat

Cole Wright, in his first year back on the mat after a long hiatus, performed admirably against formidable foes, winning two of his matches with strength and speed. Wright has battled uphill all season and has dug deep to reach new personal heights.

Hunter Ferland, another second-year wrestler, has pulled out some jaw-dropping wins this season going into States with an overall record of 11 wins and only 5 losses. Despite a couple of frustrating referee calls in Vergen-

nes, Ferland battled his way to 3rd place against some former state champs.

First-year dynamo Dillan Lacasse poured out his best efforts against three tough opponents to claim the title of State Champ. Lacasse has

shown aptitude at practice and an eagerness to learn, gaining confidence as well as increased skill all season.

Coaches Floyd Buck Jr and Don Beebe are very proud of all the wrestlers who were at Vergennes, citing good listening skills and motivation to succeed as factors leading to the overall improvement in the young wrestlers.

The Springfield, VT, Wrestling Team has made great strides over the past near-decade, expanding the program from the elementary grades to include both junior high and high school students. The growth of the program includes hosting multiple tournaments and scrimmages each season, traveling to a national competition, and purchasing new mats. All fundraising comes from the volunteer efforts of parents, wrestlers, and coaches; money is needed for tournament entrance fees, equipment, mandatory coach training, and more.

The team's overall performance at Vergennes was a capstone to a terrific season, and sincere thanks go out to Don Beebe and Floyd

Buck Jr - the team's "dynamic duo" of coaching excellence.





Agritourism Discussed In Sullivan County

To support local agriculture and also respect local zoning, planning and neighborhood con-

trol, New Hampshire Farm Bureau has supported bills that have been introduced to the NH House and Senate that addresses concerns that came out of a re-

Supreme Court Decision.

More than 40 Sullivan County elected officials, Farm Bureau officers and guests attended the Agricultural Forum at Sugar River Valley Regional Technical Center (SRVRTC). Guest speakers Paul and Nancy Franklin spoke about agritourism events held at their farm, Riverview Farm, in Plainfield including a corn maze, hayrides and private. Gail McWilliam Jellie of the NH Department of Agriculture spoke of the importance of agritourism to local, regional and statewide economies, while Representative Bob Haefner (Hudson), Chairman of the House Environment and Agriculture Committee and Representative Tara Sad (Walpole), ranking democrat on the same committee, spoke about the amendments proposed for language clarification in laws regard

ing agritourism.

Rob Johnson, New Hampshire Farm Bureau Policy Director, provided the group with handouts documenting the history of agritourism legislation in New Hampshire and copies of proposed amendments to existing legislation (RSA 21:34 and RSA 674:32) that will further clarify agritourism as "the marketing or selling at wholesale or retail, on-site and off-site, where not prohibited by local regulations, any products from the farm. Marketing includes agritourism, which means attracting visitors to attend events and activities that are accessory uses to the primary farm operation, including but not limited to, eating a meal, making over-

night stays, enjoyment of the farm environment, education about farm operations, or active involvement in the activity of the farm."

A meal featuring meatloaf made with beef from Hilltop Farm in Claremont, carrots and rolls with butter made by the middle school students, and

ice cream with maple syrup made at the maple sugarhouse of SRVRTC was prepared and served by FFA members. Deb Stevens, Agriculture instructor and FFA advisor and Sam Nelson, Forestry and Natural Resources instructor and FFA advisor at SRVRTC spoke about the technical center, programming, and an upcoming project in the Newport Town Forest to remove invasive species and improve trails and the boardwalk.





Good Turnout For Pruning Workshop

PLAINFIELD, NH--Sixty-seven attendees braved the wind and cold on Saturday, April 2, at Riverview Farm to learn proper and timely pruning techniques in apples and blueberries.
