Tarczewski Reportedly To Get Chance At NBA Summer League

PHOENIX, AZ--The *Arizona Daily Star* reported Saturday that Claremont born Kaleb Tarczewski, former center for the University of Arizona, will be getting a shot at the NBA this summer. "Tarczewski was added to the Washington Wizards' summer-league roster late on Thursday night, according to multiple reports, while MLive.com reported that Tarczewski is expected to be on the Detroit Pistons' summer-league team," reported the *Arizona Daily Star*.

Tarczewski recently completed his college career for the Arizona Wildcats men's basket-ball team. Tarczewski attended Stevens High School in Claremont for two years, leading Stevens High School Varsity Basketball to the NHIAA Final Four in 2008-2009. He transferred to St. Mark's School in Southborough, MA, after that season.

He ended his college career tied with Matt Muehlebach for the most wins by an Arizona player in program history with 110. He wrapped up his four years at Arizona ranking in the top seven all-time in games played, games started, rebounds and blocks. His averages of 9.4 points, 9.3 rebounds and 1.4 blocks per game this season were all career highs while nearly doubling his rebounding output from his junior season.


2016 NH Moose Permit Auction Now Open

CONCORD, NH--The Wildlife Heritage Foundation of New Hampshire announces the launch of the 2016 NH Moose Permit Auction, its primary fundraiser to support the programs of the N.H. Fish and Game Department. Official bid guidelines and documents can be downloaded from the Foundation's website at www.nhwildlifeheritage.org/moose-permit-auction or by calling (603) 496-2778. Sealed bids are due by August 5, 2016.

This year marks the eighth annual auction run by the Wildlife Heritage Foundation of New Hampshire. For the third year in a row, the Foundation is authorized to auction two permits, which is consistent with statewide moose population goals. The two highest bidders in the auction will receive free 2016 New Hampshire moose hunt permits, as well as 2016 New Hampshire general hunting licenses. Last year, the auction garnered bids from three states, with the highest bids tied at \$14,001. The winners were from New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

Successful bidders in the 2016 auction will be able to harvest one moose of either sex in a Wildlife Management Unit of their choice. Individuals who receive a permit in the 2016 New Hampshire open moose hunt lottery are subject to the rules of the lottery, and will not be eligible to participate in the auction. Additional information on moose hunting in New Hampshire, including rules, permits, licenses

Proceeds from the auction help support critical fish and wildlife conservation initiatives, along with education programs of the Department, such as Barry Conservation Camp, the Owl Brook Hunter Education Center, Freshwater Angler Survey, Great Bay Discovery Center, Operation Game Thief, Wildlife Recreation Access Program, aerial stocking of remote ponds, Wildlife Management Area signs and kiosks, and support of the Law Enforcement Division's Canine Unit.

Loveless Lashes Two Doubles Saturday

MANCHESTER, NH--The Force was not with the New Hampshire Fisher Cats' bats Saturday night, as they struggled to score and fell victim to a 4-0 shutout at the hands of the Harrisburg Senators at Northeast Delta Dental Stadium.

The Fisher Cats (32-41) trailed from the first inning onward, and couldn't recapture the magic they had in Friday night's 3-2 walkout victory. The Senators (40-33) benefited from a superb performance from starting pitcher Reynaldo Lopez (W, 3-5), who dealt eight innings of shutout baseball with 10 strikeouts. New Hampshire went 0-for-10 with runners in scoring position.

Harrisburg got the scoring going immediately against Fisher Cats starting pitcher Casey Lawrence (L, 2-6). Zach Collier hammered a one-out double to right, and Isaac Ballou drew a walk. Neftali Soto hit a bouncer through the middle that second baseman Christian Lopes mishandled (allowing Collier to score), and Ballou and Soto both scored on a two-out double by Kevin Keyes, giving Harrisburg a 3-0 lead.

The Senators extended their lead in the top of the seventh against new reliever Daniel Schlereth. Leadoff man Wilmer Difo drew a walk to reach first base, and an errant pickoff throw by catcher Ryan Lavarnway skittered into the right field corner. Difo made the most of his opportunity, racing around the bases and scoring on the error to make it 4-0 Harrisburg.

Lawrence took the loss, allowing three runs (all unearned) on seven hits and three walks

over six innings while striking out six.
Schlereth gave up an unearned run on a walk in one inning of work. Brady Dragmire tossed two scoreless innings, surrendering one hit and registering one strikeout.

The Fisher Cats struggled to locate their offense Sunday afternoon, falling 3-1 in the series finale against the Harrisburg Senators at Northeast Delta Dental Stadium

The team (32-42) fell back to a season-worst 10 games below .500, only scoring in the ninth inning to break up the shutout. Tyler Mapes (W, 7-5) dealt a complete game for the Senators (41-33), who didn't give up a single earned run in the last 18 innings of the series. It was the first complete game thrown against New Hampshire since Akron hurler Will Roberts did it on June 11, 2015.

The Fisher Cats will open up a three-game series against the Hartford Yard Goats Monday night, with right-hander Jeremy Gabryszwski starting for New Hampshire against Hartford righty Zach Jemiola. First pitch from

Northeast Delta Dental Stadium is at 7:05 p.m., and Ben Gellman has the call starting at 6:45 p.m. on the Fisher Cats

Radio Network.

Unit L and M Antlerless Deer Permits Available in Mid-July

CONCORD, NH--Hunters who want the chance to take additional antlerless deer in Wildlife Management Units L and M in south-eastern New Hampshire during the fall hunting seasons will soon be able to buy special permits. Hunters should note that there will be several changes in the sale of these permits this year.

Unit L Permits:

Up to 750 hunters will be allowed to purchase Special Antlerless Deer Permits for Unit L this year. This is an increase from 500 per-

mits last year. These permits will all come with 1 deer tag at a cost of \$26. New this year, Unit L permits will be sold online ONLY. Sales will begin on July 12 at 6:00 p.m. Note that if you start your online purchase session before 6:00 p.m. on that date, the Unit L permit may not show up in the list of licenses available, and you will need to start over. These permits are expected to sell out extremely quickly, so make sure to have information such


as your current New Hampshire hunting or archery license number (required for purchase), driver's license and credit card ready.

Interested hunters may purchase Unit L permits at 6:00 p.m. on July 12, 2016: Online only at www.nhfishandgame.com Unit M Permits:

Again this year, a total of up to 4,000 hunters will be allowed to purchase Special Antlerless Deer Permits for Unit M. All Unit M permits cost \$36 and come with 2 deer tags. Sales for Unit M permits will begin on July 14. Unit M permits may be purchased either online or at Fish and Game headquarters in Concord. Visit

Living with Lyme

There are many illnesses that baffle many of the experts. Some of these even spark debates about whether or not they really exist. However, for the sufferers of such illnesses, they are very real indeed. To tell them their illness is not real is to also tell them that they are not really sick. These ailments impact the lives of those who suffer from them on a large scale. These conditions tear apart not only the bodies of those who live with them daily, but also relationships and lives.

One such illness is Lyme disease. Meet 30-year-old Nici Davenport who has battled Lyme disease for many years. Her dream in life was to get married and have a family, but unfortunately her medical struggles have stolen those dreams. Not only have her hopes and dreams been dashed, but her husband found himself unable to deal with her being so sick all the time. He left her to face her struggles alone. While that might anger you, it's important to understand that this is not at all rare. Many marriages and families are torn apart by the fear, uncertainty, and difficulties that medical struggles bring. These struggles put great challenges on people, both emotionally and financially. It pulls couples in multiple directions and often creates resentment when each feels the other doesn't understand his or her pain. Likewise, with illnesses for which very little is known, there is often the case of the partner

not fully believing the sufferer is truly sick. In fact, a common fictitious belief is that doctors know everything and can treat everything. To make matters worse, the expense of tests, travel for specialists, the doctors themselves, and medications are excessively high, leading many into financial ruin.

Nici tells us that Lyme is caused by a tick bite, referring to it as a "deadly bite." It destroys your body and messes with your brain. It can be cured, but the treatments work best if caught early. Hers took years to diagnose. Lyme also leads to other serious ailments. She was bitten at age 10, complete with a bull's-eye rash. From there, she began having aches and pains, but she attributed that to the fact that she was a country girl who did country girl things, like riding horses. She started having migraines two years after the bite. She eventually was diagnosed with Lyme and 39 other serious ailments that included horrible seizures and more. She has to use oxygen and wear a heart monitor at times. She has gone from being a working professional with a high IQ to someone with brain fog that is so bad she can't even think of people's names who she knows. She has been hospitalized numerous times and was told she didn't have long to live multiple times as well. However, this woman is a fighter. She continues to fight all of her ailments, and she inspires others to continue their own fights as well. She points out that her immune system was already poor before the tick bite. Not everyone bitten gets Lyme disease, but many others are not as lucky.

Nici starts her days as we all do: getting ready for her day. This includes using a device called an infrared sauna for detox because she cannot sweat, and she has to use it for an hour a day. Sometimes, she needs help with it because of seizures and passing out. She never has an appetite, so she has to force herself to eat breakfast. Her days are full of doctor visits with multiple doctors. These are just a few examples of her daily routine. The slightest task can leave her winded and weak, yet she strives to live as normal of a life as she can and try to not look sick. By the time she is just barely into her day, she is exhausted. This is living with Lyme.

As we can clearly see, living with Lyme Disease can be devastating. However, what does the medical community say about it? Opinions vary, however Mayo Clinic's web page states the following: "Lyme disease is caused by four main species of bacteria: Borrelia burgdorferi, Borrelia mayonii, Borrelia afzelii and Borrelia garinii bacteria. Borrelia burgdorferi and Borrelia mayonii cause Lyme disease in the United States, while Borrelia


afzelii and Borrelia garinii are the leading causes of Lyme disease in Europe and Asia. The most common tick-borne illness in these regions, Lyme disease is transmitted by the bite of an infected black-legged tick, commonly known as a deer tick." It goes on to list symptoms to look out for and time frames for when the symptoms occur after the initial tick bite. The list is far too detailed to include here, so please visit their page at

I have known this brave lady for a while now personally. I've seen how loved ones shun her and abuse her. I have seen how friends and strangers act as though she is imagining it all simply because she has good days where she is able to "live" her life somewhat normally and without looking as sick as she truly is. She has even tried to return to a hobby of hers, modeling, as a way of raising awareness of the effects of this terrible disease.

It's heartbreaking how people with Lyme and other misunderstood illnesses suffer socially because of ignorance and harsh judgments that result in a lack of a true support system. This lady is always there for others in spite of her suffering. In fact, while chatting for this article, she took her free moment at the end to add anything she wanted to and used it to ask me about how I'm feeling with my own chronic illness. It just shows how generous of heart and lovely this woman is. I'm honored to know her and call her my dear friend.

The important thing to take away from this is that not all ailments are cut and dry. Doctors are not infallible. They can neither know everything nor treat everything. New studies are needed for this debilitating disease that literally breaks down the body, opens doors for other ailments, and destroys lives. There are still many doctors that refuse to acknowledge its existence, in spite of the


Give generously, give joyfully, give with your heart! When we do this the world will begin to look a little better. The sun will shine brighter. The water will be cooler. The snow will be whiter.


