## Paul Silva Reflects Upon A Championship Season

CLAREMONT, NH--It's been just over a week now since Paul Silva coached his Stevens High School Cardinals to a New Hampshire Division III championship. In that time, and over the Thanksgiving Day break, he has managed to take the time to look back on that historic November 19, 2016 date, a date 48 years in the making.

"Well, I think the city and school have been obviously waiting for a championship for a long time," Silva, the Stevens High head football coach, said in an e-mail account over the weekend in reference to the Claremont school's last gridiron championship in 1968. "Ever since I got involved in football at the Claremont Middle School level back in 2001, I have hoped that one day I could help be part of a state championship football team."

Silva's tenure as the head football coach at Stevens began in 2011 when he took over the reigns and instantly had him wondering what in the world was he getting into as the Cardinals went through a 3-6 season. "That was a tough season after losing our quarterback, Logan Batchelder, to a broken leg in our first game," Silva recalled.

The program, under Silva's tutelage, rallied, however, bouncing back to record a 5-4 record in 2012 eventually losing to Somersworth in the playoffs. The following season the Redbirds won the Western Conference championship, defeating Newport, finishing 8-3 losing at Bow in the Division III state championship game. Another struggling season came in 2014 with Stevens sporting a 2-6 record. Last year Stevens went 6-3 losing again at Bow in the playoffs. Finally, in 2016, Silva and his 39-member football squad hit paydirt finishing 9-2 with a long sought after state championship.

Prior to making his commitment to pursue a football championship at Stevens Silva spent 23 years in the banking business, making what he called a "career change" in 2004. "I worked overnight at Walmart for two years while I coached," Silva continued. "I was fortunate enough to go to work for Stevens High School in 2006, and am still there today. I work in our online learning center, setting up students and monitoring their progress toward earning credits through Virtual Learning Academy. Not every student is successful in a traditional classroom

setting, so this gives them an alternative and it is very rewarding to see a student find success through their online efforts."

Silva also is the head coach in baseball at Stevens, since 2007, and assists in the basketball program.

To be sure, Silva would be the first to point out he, alone, is not wholly responsible for

"My coaching staff is one of the big reasons we won the state championship," the sixth-year head mentor explained. "I really am not sure everybody truly understands how much work goes into preparation for just a single game. Driving to see our opponents play and taping those games, hours of film work, and writing out all the plays on paper so the scout team can seer them and run them in practice are just a few of the things they do each week, and that is in addition to the practices and the games themselves! You simply can not win at this level if you are not prepared."

Silva went on to heap piles of praise upon his defensive coordinator, Erik Anderson. "He has done a fantastic job with this group of players over the four years we have been together,"

the Stevens coach wrote. "He gets the best out of our players. He works magic, as we have often been outsized on both sides of the ball these past few years. His game plans and ingame adjustments are the best in the division. Erik is often my soundboard and I can't thank him enough for his friendship and willingness (Continued on page B2)

#### to listen."

Another member of the coaching staff drawing high praise from the head coach is Josh Duford, Silva's offensive coordinator, who took over the play calling last year. "He understands how to attack the defense and how to best utilize the players we have," the head coach emphasized. His play for play-calling

is unrivaled in the division." Matt Bean, too, cannot escape Silva's praise. The assistant line coach played for Silva for four years. "His enthusiasm and energy are contagious and he does a such a great job working with the young players and calls our jayvee defense," Silva reported,

in lauding the third member of his staff. "We are very fortunate to have him. I could go on and on all day about these three. Not only are they great coaches, they are also great friends and that makes each season so much more enjoyable."

But, no matter how great the coaching is, Silva knows he couldn't get it done without the players on the field executing the plays. "This season is really about the 39 players who dedicated themselves to their goal in June of winning a state championship and they did it!" Silva proudly boasted. "I can't really say enough about how hard they worked and what a pleasure it was to get to be at practice every day with them. You look at some of the numbers players like Richard Bell, Henri Bourque, Zach O'Brien and Parker Smith put up, and you can see we had some very talented players. There are the linemen, Brendan Bean, Aidan Cahill, Joe Desilets, Chris LaFont, Nick O'Brien, and Nick Stone who do not get the notoriety, but work in the trenches to open holes and stop the opposition each week. My hats off to everything they do, and they do it very well. Seniors Zach Stanhope and Nick LaCaillade solidified our secondary all year, making big tackles all season and in the championship game. A coach can only put 11 players on the field at a time, so there are always players who have important roles, but may not be every game starters. The contributions of seniors like Chris Beckleman, Braydon Burt, and Tim Heighes on special teams, filling in where needed, and who have played four years were vital to the success of our team. All 39 players had a role in what transpired on

Saturday and I will always be grateful for everything they did this year."

Still, there is one person Silva reported who would, perhaps, be the proudest of all in the wake of this latest football championship and that is his dad, Ralph, a former coach at Stevens who passed away three years ago. "I know he would be proud of not only me, but every one of the players for their hard work and dedication in achieving their goal of a

> state championship," Silva, the son, stated. "Not every son gets to follow in his father's footsteps, much less gets to work hand and hand with him, as I did. I will cherish that always! It was his passion for coaching and educating our young adults

that led me to pursue this field. I know now why he did what he did and I hope someday I can make an impact on this world like he did. It was a very special day, and while he may not have been here in person, I believe he was in spirit."

Lastly, Silva has been so enthused with the fan base in Claremont he was no short on words in acknowledging those who came out to support the team this season and upon the team's arrival back in town following their triumph over Interlakes/Moultonborough at the University of New Hampshire that glorious Saturday afternoon.

"I have said for years now," Silva explained, "we have one of the biggest and best fan bases in the division. When we travel, and I mean anywhere we go, no matter how far, we often outnumber the team hosting us. It is a great feeling to have that support! The crowd we had at UNH was nothing short of amazing! To see that sea of red behind us in the stands supporting us was really something to behold. There are no fans more willing to support their team than our fan base!

"It was quite a sight we witnessed in returning to Claremont after the game Saturday and seeing how many people took the time out of their day to welcome these kids home. I think the kids began to realize just what their accomplishment means to this wonderful community."

Silva's reflection upon bringing home the title was wrapped up with this final notation. "I love this city, and I love Stevens High School," Silva exclaimed. To bring this state championship back to Claremont means a great deal to me, and to this team!"

## **More Post-Season Honors At Stevens**

CLAREMONT, NH--The success of the fall sports season at Stevens High School in Claremont has taken yet another meritorious advancement upon the recent announcement that the boys varsity soccer head coach, Jason Stone, has been selected the New Hampshire Division III Coach of the Year.

Stone's honor comes at the heels of an earlier announcement that Doug Beaupre was picked to collect Athletic Director of the Year. The Stevens golf, bowling, field hockey and boys and girls soccer teams all participated in post-season playoff competitions and the football team brought home a state championship enabling Stevens to take pride in a very successful fall season.

Stone piloted his boys team to a championship game confrontation against Hopkinton only to fall short in a 1-0 defeat. The Cardinals dropped their very first game of the season and lost their final regular season game winning 14 consecutive games in between. The Redbirds then went on to win three playoff games before going down in defeat in the finals.

The Stevens head coach was a member of the 1993 Stevens team that went to the semifinals. Stone was trying to win the first state championship in boys soccer at Stevens since 1989.

Stone has completely turned around a downspiral in the boys program going 6-10, 13-5, 10-6, 10-6, and 14-2 in regular season play during his five-year tenure.

"We have a lot of returning players," Stone reported earlier in the year. "We only lost one starter from last year and that has been our main ingredient for our success this year.

They've all been there playing together for eight years now. We got to work more on details this year rather than working from scratch." Stone keep himself busy in the Claremont Youth Soccer program. So busy, in fact, he recently resigned as President. "I underestimated how busy I was," he said. "That youth thing has 300 kids. That's a lot of teams and kids to take care of but, as long as the kids can have fun, I will continue to have a part." His two boys, Oliver and Parker, are keeping the sport alive and well in the Stone household playing in the elementary level. Stone has also started an Under 10 indoor team in Grantham.

"A good feeder system is important," the Stevens coach explained. "The kids will be ready when they get to the high school level. That's what makes my job at the high school fun."

The post-season honors did not stop at Stevens with Stone's award. Noah Spaulding, a forward on Stone's near-championship squad, earned First Team All-State honors. Spaulding, a junior, drew heaps of praise from Keene State head coach Rick Scott, who attended all three championship games at Southern New Hampshire University on a recruiting mission. Spaulding had 33 goals along with 21 assists. Teammates Ethan Sweet and Logan Bonneau, both seniors, merited Second Team honors.

ment, registration and safety education for NH. Following are the ground rules for the weekend:

All snowmobiles legally registered in New Hampshire may operate in Vermont and Maine during the reciprocal weekend. All other Vermont and Maine snowmobile laws and rules must be complied with, including Vermont's mandatory liability insurance, safety education certification (if born after 7/1/1983), and youth operation requirements.

All snowmobiles legally registered to ride in Vermont and Maine may operate on New Hampshire trails during the three-day open weekend. To be legally registered in Vermont, snowmobiles must display, pursuant to Vermont law, a valid Vermont Association of Snow Travelers, Inc. Trails Maintenance Assessment, also known as the Trails Pass. All other New Hampshire laws and rules regarding the operation of snowmobiles must be adhered to, such as speed limits, youth operation standards, etc.

At this particular funeral which I mentioned, the husband was not well, and chairs were set up for him and others. He sat when he came to the site. As her casket was carried to the gravesite, this gentleman stood and held a salute until the casket was resting above

the grave. He then resumed his seat as I finished the service of committal. He stood and saluted as taps were played and the flag ceremony completed. It was probably the most moving ceremony I've officiated. It was beautiful and I admire this man for his dedication and love for wife and country.

I hope that we can all keep the image of a man honoring his wife, a fellow, veteran. As we remember this picture, let us also remember the men and women who have served our country. Let us not worry whether they are red, brown, yellow, black or white. Let us not worry if their religion is ours or different. Let us not worry about their orientation and beliefs. Once we know in our minds that they are all the same, let us learn to remove those boundaries from all people in our community and beyond. Let us accept all children, men and women as our own, looking at them with hopes of love and justice for the world. Then we shall be free!

Before my latest adventure for One-on-One: Countryside Chat on the Road, a friend put me in contact with Andrea White, owner and operator of Tender Heart Wildlife Rehab in Berryville, AR. I had the honor of meeting her during my trip through Arkansas, and we discussed the struggles and the joys faced by an animal rescuer.

One of the biggest struggles faced by animal rescuers is financial. Many rescuers put their own money into their work, and their love for these animals can be quite expensive. Between food, medical supplies, shelter, and other supplies, finances are often depleted quickly. This requires the rescuer to reach out to the community for assistance so that they can continue helping sick and injured animals, as well as baby animals who have lost their mothers and need to be raised until they are big enough to survive on their own. Donations are a huge help, but one of the ways Andrea obtains the funds needed is through wood burnings that she can then sell (as pictured). She



gives of herself by spending time and energy creating these works of art for the sake of the animals, not keeping anything for herself. The goal of Tender Heart Wildlife Rehab is to treat the animals and release them back into the wild. This requires a great deal of hard work and time, which can truly take a toll on the rescue workers. From seeing the suffering of the animals to feeding baby animals every few hours throughout the night (up to 13 at a time for animals which are born in large numbers such as possums), it can quickly become an overwhelming job that leaves one exhausted physically and emotionally. However, Andrea will be the first to tell you that it's well worth the heartache, exhaustion, and hard work when you see one of the animals you helped running free back into the wild once released. It is easy to see that being an animal rescuer is one of the toughest jobs you'll ever love.

While visiting with Andrea, she told me many stories about her work. She told me about deer she previously helped and how rescues are no longer allowed to take in deer because of diseases. She also told me about a bunch of baby possums she was tending to and hoping to release soon. Her stories were full of joyful releases and heartbreaking losses, which are all part of her job. This line of work is a labor of love, and you can be a part of it.

Andrea's wood burnings are for sale. You can call her at the number listed on the advertisement that I am including with this article, or you can find her and her organization on Facebook and online for more information. Please do contact her. I own some of her work, and I plan on getting more. These items make a great keepsake to look at and remember how your money went to save a precious creature in need. If you simply want to make a financial donation that is tax deductible, you can do that too. Contact her today for more information. Unfortunately, because this is a hospital, we cannot have contact with the animals. Human contact is not allowed by rescue agencies due to the need for them to still maintain a healthy separation from humans once they are released back into the wild. However, you and I can still help from a safe distance through our financial support from purchasing wood burnings or by making tax deductible donations.

I was truly unprepared for the emotional rollercoaster this visit would take me on. I have included a small quote below from one of our conversations to give you an idea of why. On one hand, I'm inspired and overjoyed to see the work Andrea does and to know that there are others like her who tend to the least of God's creatures. I believe we are created and given this world with the job of being good stewards of all within it, including each other. #LoveOthersWell.

"The little mouse that was caught by a cat died. One of the emaciated bunnies has died and another is not doing well at all. I will be surprised if it survives the night. The other two bunnies are still on pretty shaky ground but holding their own for the time being. This is the reason the general public needs to get babies to licensed and trained rehabbers as soon as they are found, and not three days later when they decide they just can't get them to eat and it's not working. Once they are so severely dehydrated and emaciated, it is near impossible to save them. Please pray for these babies. Even when there is nothing we can do, it's never too late to turn to God for healing! He can still work miracles!" ~ Andrea White, Tender Heart Wildlife Rehab


