Coach Silva Shares Thoughts on New Football Season

CLAREMONT, NH--The *e-Ticker News* recently spoke with Stevens High School Football Coach Paul Silva about the new season coming up.

How do you see the new season shaping up? We obviously lost a great deal of our offensive production to graduation and prep school, but that is the nature of high school sports. It is cyclical and we will have some younger players take on a more significant role this year and get their chance to start and show what they can do, so I am excited for them and look forward to seeing them mature and improve. I think it will be an interesting season and I am looking forward to it, as I do each year.

What is the makeup of the team this year compared to last year's

winning squad? We have 38 players on the roster and 26 will be Sophomores or Freshman so it will be a learning experience for many at the varsity level. The good thing is we will have virtually the entire backfield and receiving corp back in 2018, so they will get a significant


amount of varsity experience this coming season. The flip side of that is we will have to replace virtually the entire line in 2018, but as I said that is the nature of high school sports.

What do you see as weaknesses and strengths? I think our line, on both sides of the ball, will be our main strength. We return Brendan Bean, Aidan Cahill, Joe Desilets, and Nick Stone from last year's team, so that experience and leadership will be crucial for our young players stepping into starting roles. Our experience at the so-called "skill" positions could be an issue for us as we will have many younger players being asked to step up to starting roles and will be learning on the job against some very good teams.

What adjustments are you/will you be making to compensate for inexperienced players? Well, I think it would be a mistake to change too much of what we do, as we have run this offense for the last two years. I have installed a couple of formations that I have run in the past that I like and am comfortable with. They are a little less complicated than some of our spread packages. I was planning on sim-

We have gone at a slower pace with some things, but overall I am very pleased with the work effort of this group of kids

How does the rest of Div. III look to you this year? This Division is one of the most competitive, if not the most competitive, Division of the three. There are just some outstanding teams, players, and coaches in Division III. I think the North Conference is particularly competitive. You have Newport, Kearsarge, Inter-Lakes, Monadnock, Newfound, Mascoma, and Fall Mountain to contend with. and I expect all of them to difficult games. Now that we have been in this division for a few years and started playing the same teams each year, you start to develop those rivalries like we already have with Newport and Fall Mountain. If you are not prepared each and every week, you simply can not win in this Division.

When is your first game? We open up at Mascoma this Saturday. The game starts at 2:00 p.m. I know the coaching staff is already preparing for the game. I have been watching film and this is a very tough opponent to open up with when you are replacing 7 starters on defense, as they will pound the ball into the off tackle hole with 7 to 9 blockers, so you have to gear up and be physical which puts a lot of pressure on these young players going up against a veteran team with some big lineman. I have faith that our guys will be ready!



Then proudly list those courses on your resume to show potential employers you proactively focus on your career development.


"eclipse" social media, and life in general, with some fun, some laughter, some sharing, and some kindness that we can all appreciate. #LoveOthersWell, my friends.
