SHS Football Kicks Off Season with Win

The Stevens Football Team opened the 2017 season, and defense of their NHIAA Division III State Championship, on Saturday afternoon, traveling to Canaan to take on the Mascoma Royals. The Cardinals spoiled the host's opening day with a convincing 46-7 victory.

After Derrick Stanhope intercepted a Mascoma pass on the first series of the game, the Cardinals marched 42 yards in 7 plays, with Joe Desilets capping the drive on a 4 yard touchdown run. He also ran in the conversion to make it a quick 8-0 lead. On the next possession for Stevens, they marched 66 yards in 8 plays, with Keaghan McAllister scoring his first varsity touchdown on a 2 yard run. He also added the conversion to make it 16-0 after a quarter of play.

After holding the Royals on the ensuing possession, the Cardinals would cover the 76 yards in 10 plays, with Desilets scoring his

second touchdown of the day on an 8 yard run. McAllister added his third conversion run, and it was 24-0. The Cardinals, who played a stifling defense all afternoon, shut down Mascoma, and on the punt, McAllister came through untouched, blocking the punt, catching it before it hit the ground, and streaked

24 yards for his second touchdown of the day. Alex DeVre added the 2 point conversion run. Mascoma was forced to punt from their own end zone on their next possession and when the snap was high the Mascoma punter had to jump and came down out of bounds at the back of the end zone for a Stevens safety, and a 34-0 halftime lead.

The Royals recovered a Stevens fumble to start the third quarter, but on their first play after the turnover, returned the favor, as safety Baylor Rozzell jumped a pass down the middle of the field, picked it off, and raced 72 yards for the touchdown. The kick was no good but it was 40-0 Stevens. On their next possession, Damon Roy scored his first varsity touchdown on a 1 yard run. The extra point attempt was blocked, but the Cardinals held a commanding 46-0 lead. Mascoma would add a late touchdown run to account for the 46-7 final score.

The offensive and defensive line for the Cardinals, led by Captains Brendan Bean, Aidan Cahill, & Nick Stone, along with Joe Desilets, who also took snaps in the backfield, Phil Mason, Hunter Durkee, and Tucker Derosier, played a terrific game, consistently opening holes for the Cardinal running backs. On the flip side they shut down anything the Royals tried on offense, controlling the line of scrimmage all day.

McAllister benefited from their strong play, as the sophomore running back rushed for 101 yards and a touchdown, on his 13 carries. Sophomore quarterback Quentin Bicknell ran the offense without a hitch in his first varsity start behind center and completed both of his passes on the day for 24 yards.

Stevens will play their home opener this Friday night as they host a big, and talented, Somersworth Hilltopper team at Barnes Park. Game time is 7:00 p.m.



It's Good to Give



Unity Historical Society to Host Two NH Humanities To Go Programs

UNITY, NH--The Unity Historical Society will be hosting two NH Humanities To Go Programs. On Sunday, Sept. 17, 2:00 p.m., the program, "Rosie's Mom: Forgotten Women of the First World War" will be presented. One hundred years ago, a full generation before Rosie the Riveter, American women rolled up their sleeves and entered war industries where they had never been before. They ran powerful machinery, learned new skills and faced the sullen hostility of the men in the shops. In this illustrated lecture, historian Carrie Brown reveals their courage and their hard work, asks what impact "the Great War" had on their lives and explores how these women helped shape the work that their more famous daughters would do in the next World War.

On Sunday, Oct. 15, 2:00 p.m., the program will be, "Songs of Emigration: Storytelling Through Traditional Irish Music". Through traditional music, Jordan Tirrell-Wysocki relays some of the adventures, misadventures and emotions experienced by Irish emigrants. The focus is on songs about leaving Ireland, sometimes focusing on the reasons for leaving (a man who is driven from his land by English persecution); sometimes revealing what happened upon arrival (an immigrant drafted into the Union army during the Civil War); and sometimes exploring the universal feeling of homesickness of a stranger in a strange land. The presenter discusses the historical context of these songs, interspersing their stories with tunes from Ireland that made their way into New England's musical repertoire, played on his fiddle or guitar.
