# Demars To Run in 2018 Boston Marathon

CLAREMONT, NH--After training hard all summer, Claremont marathoner Michael Demars recently completed the Steamtown Marathon in 2 hours, 54 minutes, 45 seconds. Demars was disappointed with his time in the 2017 Boston Marathon, a time most runners would love to claim, of 3:01:12, 72 seconds off his personal target time.

"There were legitimate reasons why it didn't happen," Demars told the *e-Ticker News*' columnist Les St. Pierre in April. "I could have done it that day if I had made better decisions along the way. That is something I can take to the next one."

And the next Boston Marathon for Demars will be next year.

"I've applied for and been accepted into the 2018 Boston Marathon this coming April," he told the *e-Ticker News* last week.

# Cardinals Score Big Win Against Lakers, 28-19

The Stevens Cardinals and Inter-Lakes/
Moultonborough Lakers met in a rematch of
the last year's State Championship Game at
Barnes Park on Friday night. This was also a
very big game for both teams in determining
whether or not there would be any postseason
action for them. Stevens came in at 3-2 with a
chance to punch their ticket to the playoffs,
while the Lakers came in at 2-3 and needing a
win to bolster their chances of making the
postseason.

The Lakers would dent the scoreboard first, as Landan Keyser found a hole off the left side, broke several tackles, and raced 71 yards for a touchdown. The extra point kick was no good but the Lakers were out to a quick 6-0 lead in the first quarter. Stevens would answer that score putting together a 14 play, 72 yard touchdown drive that culminated in a second quarter, 2 yard touchdown run by Keaghan McAllister. McAllister added the conversion run and

point split the uprights to make it 13-8. Once again the Cardinals answered. Just before the half Quentin Bicknell could not find an open receiver and headed for the end zone, scoring from 10 yards out, vaulting over a Laker defender for the touchdown. The touchdown capped a 10 play, 67 yard drive. McAllister added the conversion and the halftime score had Stevens up 16-13.


Stevens would add to their lead in the third quarter on their second possession. Going with an extra pair of lineman, the Cardinal's Tucker Derosier, Brendan Bean, Aidan Cahill, Phillip Mason, Nick Stone, Hunter Durkee, and Isaiah Forrest opened some big holes and it took just 5 plays to cover the 61 yards. The drive was capped by a 20 yard touchdown run from Damon Roy. The conversion failed but Stevens was up 22-13. Stevens got a big interception from Keaghan McAllister mid-way through the final quarter, his second pick of the night, and he returned it to the Lakers 29 yard line. It took Stevens 8 plays but when Baylor Rozzell dived into end zone on a 7 yard touchdown run the Cardinals had a 28-13 lead. The score stayed that way following the failed con-

The Lakers would waste little time getting back in the game as they scored on their first play from scrimmage following the Stevens score. Robinson found Deante Miller open on the sideline and Miller deftly found a way through the Cardinal defenders for a 37 yard touchdown reception. Trying to make it a one possession game with time winding down the Lakers went for the two point conversion, however Derrick Stanhope swatted the pass to the ground and kept the Cardinals up by two scores at 28-19. Stevens would control the action the rest of the way, to record their first win this year in front of their home fans, who often outnumber the host team's fans when Stevens hits the road. The win ensures the Cardinals a spot in the upcoming Division III playoffs. Stevens will now be playing for a higher seed and an opening round home game.

McAllister had another big game as he rushed the ball 27 times for 142 yards and a touchdown to go with his 2 interceptions. Four Cardinal ball-carriers found the end zone. Baylor Rozzell had 83 yards on his 10 carries and a touchdown. Quentin Bicknell directed the Cardinal offense all night and picked up 27 yards on his 8 rushes, with a touchdown. He also completed 4 of his 7 pass attempts for 31 yards, and recorded a team high 7 tackles on defense with a fumble recovery. Damon Roy had 36 yards on his 4 carries and a touchdown. Stevens lineman paved the way for 333 yards on the ground on 56 rushes for an average of 6.5 per rush.

Stevens will travel to Fall Mountain this Saturday evening, October 21st, for a 7PM tilt with the Wildcats.

# The Glory of the Garden

My mother was a wonderful gardener. She talked to her plants and their response was to grow and flourish! I've managed to keep some of her plants alive, but she has been gone 25 years and it gets more difficult. I have some of her grandmother's thyme still flourishing in her garden (my garden), I have a Christmas Cactus that was hers, but my greatest treasure is her bay plant which is close to 50 years old! For many years I carted it in and out every summer, then my son did; now it has taken up permanent residence in a room that is cool in the winter and comfortable in the summer.

She also collected poetry. One of her favorites is this written by an unknown writer:

> "Oh Adam was a gardener and God who made him sees, That half of every gardener's time is spent upon his knees. Then when his work is finished, he can bow his head to pray, For the glory of the garden, it does not pass away!"

As I walked this week, I thought of this poem. The gardens are fading. We begin now to pull up the non producing tomato plants, lettuce roots and such. Things like beets can stay in a little longer. We can plant bulbs that will produce tulips and daffodils and crocus. I looked at the hills surrounding me and the color was beautiful. Perhaps not as vibrant as they sometimes are, but each tree was raising its hands in praise to its Maker! Then I saw beyond the trees the sky which was so blue that you could barely believe it. I looked at the ground and there were the same leaves, red, yellow, brown just waiting to be taken into the depths of the earth and replenish all that comes from the earth.

The eternity of the world is expressed in each season of the year, but I think that as we watch the leaves die and fall to the ground, we are most aware of that eternal life. Nothing ends. There is always time to wait for a new beginning. As that first gardener, Adam, tilled the soil, maybe he didn't know what would come forth, but he relied on something beyond himself to make the wheat grow, to make the figs and olives ripen on the trees. Yes, he worked hard and he must have had a wonderful faith to know that his work would bring from the soil enough to sustain him and his family through the months when there was nothing growing.

As the year draws to a close, look at the good things that happened. Know that, like Adam, our work is not in vain. Know that through the cold and dark of winter, the frozen earth is still alive waiting for the first warm rays of sunshine to bring forth once again all that we need for our existence.

We have lost some precious souls in recent weeks. Remember that their death is a passage from one plain to another. They are still a part of our lives. They are still with us.


