

"A transition like this is a testament to the growth and progress our league has achieved in a short period of time. None of this would have been possible without the passion and dedication of our members to this amazing sport. We hope the future growth potential and increased accessibility of this new space will provide Twin State Derby with the tools to continue to be a leader in women's roller derby for the Upper Valley and possibly for all of New England."

Roller derby was revived in its modern incarnation by a group of women in Texas in 2002. Since that time, the sport of women's flat-track roller derby has exploded internationally. As a Class A member of the Women's Flat Track Derby Association, or WFTDA, Twin State Derby is honored to be one of over 400 skater-owned-and-operated leagues worldwide that have united to lead the growing sport of women's flat track roller derby.

Twin State Derby has practiced in Enfield, NH, since its founding in 2010. Particularly in the past two years, the size of the league has grown significantly from 20 members to over 60 members of all genders.

TSD's focus on training new skaters and officials in a progressive curriculum, in addition to onboarding of new members intentionally and with focus on personal investment in success, has contributed to this growth and retention.

"Leasing a dedicated practice space opens up so many doors for us as a league," said Steve Hender, aka, "My Baby Daddy," the head coach of Twin State Derby. "We can set our own schedules to accommodate all of the skill levels within our league, and customize the space to our needs. It has been a literal



The team's most recent sanctioned game was Saturday, June 16, in Concord, NH, against long-time rivals Granite State Roller Derby. The regulation team's next game will be against Southshire Roller Derby in Manchester, VT, and their next game in the Upper Valley will be on September 29th at Union Arena in Woodstock, VT.



Biggio's Blast Not Enough As 'Cats Fall In Altoona

ALTOONA, PA - Cavan Biggio homered as part of a four-RBI performance and Bo Bichette had two hits with two runs scored, but the New Hampshire Fisher Cats (Blue Jays) dropped their second consecutive game to the Altoona Curve (Pirates) Saturday in what was a 9-5 loss at Peoples Natural Gas Field.

The Fisher Cats (39-28) opened the scoring in the top of the first inning. Jon Berti singled and Bichette followed with a double. Biggio drove in the first run of the night with a sacrifice fly.

A couple of walks proved costly for New Hampshire starter Justin Dillon in the bottom of the fourth inning. Bryan Reynolds walked, Jin-De Jhang singled and Jordan George walked to load the bases. Stephen Alemais tied the game with a sacrifice fly and Logan Ratledge ripped a double into the left field corner to put the Curve up 2-1.

The first five batters reached in the Altoona fifth and all five scored. Will Craig's 10th homer of the season was a three-run shot. Reynolds then doubled, scoring on a single by Jhang as the Curve opened up a 6-1 lead.

New Hampshire cut the lead to 6-4 in the top of the sixth. Jon Berti was hit-by-pitch, Bichette singled and Biggio ripped his 14th home run. He now has 52 RBI on the year, tied for second-most in the Eastern League.

The Curve (34-28) answered with a second three-run homer of the game in the bottom of the sixth inning. Craig walked, Reynolds singled and Jhang's third hit of the night - a home run - made it 9-4.

The Fisher Cats picked up a fifth run in the top of the eighth inning. Bichette walked, scoring on a double by Harold Ramirez. Ramirez also had two hits for New Hampshire (2-for-4).

Pedro Vasquez (W, 1-4) picked up his first win of the season, working the first six innings

for Altoona. Dillon (L, 1-2) took the loss. Zach Jackson retired all seven batters he faced in a strong relief effort for the Fisher Cats, striking out three batters.

The bats came alive for the New Hampshire Fisher Cats (Blue Jays) on **Sunday** with a 9-1 win over the Altoona

The Junior Showcase Underwood Game was played Saturday at Saint Anselm College. Juniors from all 4 Divisions had to try out for the game and get the chance to display their athletic and baseball skills before a number of college coaches. Junior Trey Theriault from Stevens was one of 34 players selected to play in the game. He was also a Division III 3rd Team All-State selection after batting .375 with 14 RBI this season. The players were broken up into two teams of 17 and Theriault was assigned to Team Black.

He played 3rd base,




