Poland Wins, Ending Long Super Street Drought

CLAREMONT, N.H. – Super Street star Ben Poland put three seasons of disappointment behind him Saturday, August 4, at Claremont Speedway, rocketing to victory in the night's 40-lap main event.

Wild Cat powerhouse Zach Lyn won both his heat race and the four-holer feature, and Chris Riendeau stormed to his track-high sixth win of the summer, topping the Pepsi Street Stock 25-lapper to move one point atop Bryan Town in their division's championship battle.

Poland, a force week in and week out, hadn't visited Daddy's Pizza Victory Lane since 2015. Though he'd led many laps in the past 50-plus R.E. Hinkley Super Street feature events, misfortune had often ridden with him. Many almost assumed she would rear her ugly head again Saturday. Poland, though, had other plans.

Firing from row two of the 18-car field, the Charlestown pilot took the lead from Ken Fowler as they blasted down the backchute on lap four and then withstood an all-out challenge from Ricky Bly to become the division's seventh different feature winner this season.

Bly got up for second on lap seven and, for many circuits, he and Poland raced under a blanket. Alex Poisson got up for third at the half-race point but on this night, it was a twoman race at the front, a battle won by Poland, who took the checkers four lengths ahead of Bly.

Poisson's strong run netted him a seasonhigh third. Aaron Fellows returned from an early-race jingle to earn the four spot, and Dylan Bodreau came from deep in the field twice too, coming home fifth on the night to retain his points lead. Poland and Bodreau won the night's qualifying races.

The Pepsi Street Stocks went 25-lap caution-free, with Chris Riendeau edging past Chris Colburn on lap nine and then simply driving away from the field to win by nearly a full straightaway.

Colburn, gunning to duplicate his earlier heat race win, finished his strong night's work in second. Bryan Town, Lenny Silver, and Robbie Streeter completed the top five. Riendeau, who's entered the night's competition one marker behind Town, gained two points on the night to move into the top spot by a single point.

The T-Bird Mini Mart Wild Cats, like the Street Stocks, put their 25-lap feature race into


the books caution free. Zach Lyn, charging from row three, made easy work of winning for the fourth time this summer.

Lyn took control on lap two, dropping Kyle Currier to second and then cruising to victory nearly a halflap ahead of rookie Kyle Templeton, whose runnerup finish moved him to second in the points parade. Currier earned the third-place hardware, Erin Aiken was fourth, and Raven Streeter fifth.

Next Friday, August 10, Claremont Speedway will host its annual '80s Night, with the Senior Tour Auto Racers (STAR) joining the Super Streets, Street Stocks, and Wild Cats in a full card of oval track racing. Post time is 7 p.m.

Fans are reminded that one of the biggest nights of the season is fast approaching at

Walk-Off Inside the Park HR Gives Fisher Cats Dramatic 7-6 Win

MANCHESTER, NH— Jon Berti led off the bottom of the ninth with an inside the park home run to give the New Hampshire Fisher Cats (Toronto Blue Jays Double-A affiliate) a thrilling 7-6 win over the Erie SeaWolves (Detroit Tigers) on Sunday afternoon at Northeast Delta Dental Stadium. With the score tied 6-6 in the bottom of the ninth inning, Berti hit the first pitch from John Schreiber high off the right field wall. Daz Cameron jumped to make the catch, but couldn't come down with it, and fell to the ground as Berti sprinted around the bases and dove head first into home plate.

The win secures a 2-1 series victory for the Fisher Cats (64-46), who have a 2.5 game lead in first place in the Eastern League's Eastern Division.

Erie started with three runs in the top of the first inning. Sergio Alcantara singled and Willi Castro homered for a 2-0 lead. Josh Lester reached on an error, and scored on a double by catcher Jake Rogers.

New Hampshire's catcher Pat Cantwell ripped a solo home run in the bottom of the second inning to make it 3-1. Gunnar Heidt singled, Andrew Guillotte doubled and Forrest Wall plated both with a single off the right field wall to make it 3-3.

The second home run of the game for the SeaWolves made it 5-3 on a two-run shot by Josh Lester in the top of the third inning.

The Fisher Cats narrowed the gap to 5-4 in the bottom of the fourth inning. Eduard Pinto walked, advanced to second on a wild pitch, and came home on a base knock by Guillotte.

New Hampshire moved in front for the first time in the game in the bottom of the sixth inning on RBI doubles by Forrest Wall and Bo Bichette. Bichette's Eastern League-leading 35th double plated Wall to put the Fisher Cats up 6-5.

The SeaWolves tied the game in the top of the seventh. Alcantara singled and Castro doubled. A groundout scored the run and the teams were even at six.



New Schedule For Footballers

Are you ready for some football?

Yup! It's here. Football season, that is.

Equipment issue for the Stevens football team takes place Thursday and Friday of this week with double session tryouts scheduled for the following Monday. Those sessions will take place at Monadnock Park at 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

So, what can we expect from the 2018 Stevens Cardinals high school team this year? Another playoff season? Perhaps, but if that is to come to fruition, head coach Paul Silva just might have to come up with a few tricks up his sleeve. You see, he won't be able to focus on the same teams he has been playing the past few seasons as new teams will be entering into Division III this season.

The Cardinals will play nine games this year. There will be no bye week, as has been prominent in the past.

Stevens will open its season August 31 at home playing against Epping. New teams on the schedule include Laconia, Lebanon, Hopkinson-Hillsboro, and Trinity, a Catholic school out of Manchester. Tough trekking for the Redbirds will include a Friday night game on the road at Somersworth and a two-game stretch that has the Cardinals playing Lebanon and Laconia back to back on the road.

"We will do as we always do and prepare for the team we play that week," reported Coach Silva in an e-mail correspondence.

Silva, who had absolutely no say in putting the schedule together, knows he has a huge task in front of him.

"In Division III, if you start allowing yourself to look at this team, or that team, and saying anything like it should be an easy week, you will find yourself in big trouble," the Stevens coach cautioned. "With the teams and coaches we are going up against, you better be well prepared or it will be a long game. We will watch film on each opponent and put together a game plan we think will give us the best chance to try and win the game."

Laconia and Lebanon are said to be strong teams, according to Silva, but the strength of the schedule doesn't stop there. "We also have to play Newport in week two, always a difficult opponent, as Kearsarge will be, and we haven't seen Hopkinson-Hillsboro or Trinity, so we will have to watch a lot of film to be ready for them."

Silva, fresh off a weekend that saw two Stevens players participate in the annual Shrine classic, a 23-14 win by Vermont over New Hampshire, takes extreme pride in his grid program and its players at the Claremont school.



"I enjoy seeing young players develop into great young men and I get my satisfaction seeing them rewarded for their hard work with a big win, or a well-played game," he stated in his e-mail report. "I have had great pleasure to see Stevens' players in the past, and this year, Aidan Cahill and Nick Stone, get to represent their school, team, and community in the Shrine Maple Sugar Bowl Game, while raising money for such a great cause. That is very rewarding. We have had some success in recent years because of some great coaches and players that I am very fortunate to get to work with on a daily basis during the season. They work very hard for what they have gotten."

Silva is fortunate he is not losing any of his coaching staff entering the 2018 season. "Eric Anderson, who I really rely on a great deal and who runs my defense, will be back, as will Matt Bean, who is great to have on the staff and does a great job with the younger linemen and the JV defense, and Pete Lynch, who came on

board last year, and calls the offense for the JV's and works the tower on varsity game days, will also be returning and I am very fortunate to have these coaches," Coach Silva lauded.

In addition, it is believed former player and Shrine participant Logan Batchelder will return as a volunteer assistant.

To be sure, it should be a very interesting fall on the turf at Barnes Park this season. "Our goal every season is try and win enough games to get into the playoffs," Silva exclaimed. "If you can get in, you have a chance. That goal won't change. We will need to replace some very good linemen, as we lost three All-State linemen, on both sides of the ball. That being said, part of the enjoyment of coaching in high school is that while it is disappointing to lose players, they graduate and get to go on to the next chapter in their lives, and I am happy for them. The younger players then get their opportunity to start and develop just as those who graduated had their chance. It really is a cycle, and very rewarding when you see those younger players get their chance to start and play regularly. I am hoping that we can find those players and be competitive each and every week."

Kibbe Challenges Two Charges

NEWPORT, NH—A former Claremont Police officer has filed a motion in Sullivan County Superior Court asking the judge to dismiss two of six criminal charges he is facing. The Valley News reported last week that Ian Kibbe had filed to dismiss the charges of conspiracy to commit perjury and attempted perjury. The counts allege that he falsely claimed, in an affidavit, that he had found weapons "in plain view" during the search of a convicted felon. According to prosecutors, Kibbe allegedly opened a suitcase and bag, uncovering a baton and a handgun, having done so unlawfully. According to the Valley News, Kibbe says the allegedly false statements he made weren't capable of affecting the probable cause hearing. Kibbe also pleaded not guilty to unsworn falsification and obstructing government administration charges, according to the Valley News reporting.

Kibbe and another officer, Mark Burch, along with a state trooper, a former Claremont officer, went to Christopher Ratcliffe's apartment last February to arrest him for a protective order violation.


It important to remember that holding on to a grudge and not forgiving is damaging only ourself. It doesn't harm the one who has done wrong. It harms us.

Suicide: Wrong Answer To a Deeper Question

We seem to live in a world where pain and suffering are a growing problem. Depression over any number of things drive people to despair and hopelessness: domestic violence, career and marital problems, even chemical imbalance from mental illness or medical struggles. Whatever the cause, real or imagined, the devastation is very real, and the fight to survive and overcome suicidal thoughts is one that no words can fully describe.

First of all, the worst thing one can say to someone struggling with depression is that they should just "get over it" or "let it go." The problem is more deeply rooted than that. Its all consuming grip on the heart and mind of the sufferer is one that requires professional help, and sometimes the causes require medication for the sufferer to receive proper help. So, whereas the individual feels death is the only answer for relief and others believe getting a grip on oneself is the answer, neither is true. Depending on which reports you read, there are 25 suicide attempts for every successful one, and according to an article published at this time last year on Live Science, 1 million people in the U.S. attempt suicide with 800,000 individuals dying globally each year. These are only among the adults, and it doesn't even take into account youth related suicide.

For those suffering from suicidal thoughts, I have a suggestion that is a bit out of the box. I know you most likely struggle with faith, but perhaps a different perspective might help. It is said that of those who attempted suicide, a large percentage have one thing in common: last minute regret of their attempt. I cannot say of your situation, "This too shall pass." Not all things do, especially when they involve struggles with medical health, mental health, abuse, or other serious issues. However, I can say that death is permanent, and by choosing it, you miss out on the chance to continue trying to change your situation. If it's a situation that cannot be changed, you miss out on time with loved ones and the opportunity to use your struggles to teach or inspire others to continue their own fights. So, how about "death" of a different kind?

Rather than a physical death, there comes a time when we must do as I call "dying of self." This means to release our ideas of what we are or are not and try to see ourselves, and therefore our situations, differently. It's hard not to focus on the trials and tribulations of our world, but beyond those is where we find our hope. It's rather like clouds that surround a mountaintop. The onlooker knows there's a mountain there, but the clouds obscure it from view. The same holds true to all of the things held back from one's sight by despair, pain, and fear. These troubles blind us and prevent us from seeing our worth and the gifts that we bring to this world. They convince us of the ultimate lie that we are worthless with nothing to offer. Each person is unique, and as such, each person has his or her own special piece of life to add to the lives of others. That piece could be experience that they can share with someone younger, or it could be comfort for someone in pain. Your gift could be as simple as offering love and friendship to someone who is lonely. These abilities to share your life, your experiences, and your love with another makes you more valuable than you can possibly imagine. Suicide not only steals your life from you, but it also robs others of the chance to be with you and benefit from your life, your experience, and your love.

So, instead of suicide, which is never the answer, try this death of a different kind. By dying of oneself, it allows you to rethink who and what you are. It lets you think about the bigger picture and your role in it. Likewise, it can lead to a deeper faith that lasts long after your time in this world ends. Your continued fight and your efforts to change your mindset will go even further by showing others the value of never giving up.
