

#### 2019 NH Moose Hunt Lottery Opens

CONCORD, NH — New Hampshire's 2019 moose hunt lottery is now open. Enter today for your chance on the adventure of a lifetime — hunting moose in the rugged woods of the Granite State. The lottery entrance fee is \$15 for New Hampshire residents and \$25 for non-residents.

To enter the New Hampshire moose hunt lottery, visit www.huntnh.com/hunting/moose.html where you can enter online or print out a mailin application. You can also pick up an application at any Fish and Game license agent, NH Fish and Game Headquarters, or Fish and Game Regional offices.

Moose hunt lottery applications for 2019 must be postmarked or submitted online by midnight Eastern Time on May 31, 2019, or delivered to the Licensing Office at NH Fish and Game Headquarters at 11 Hazen Drive in Concord before 4:00 p.m. that day. Winners will be selected through a computerized random drawing on June 21 at the NH Fish and Game Department in Concord.

Applicants can enter the moose hunt lottery once per year. A bonus-point system improves the chances for unsuccessful applicants who apply in each consecutive year. Each point translates to a chance in the drawing. For example, last year the overall odds of a resident applicant being drawn were 1 in 76, while resident applicants with a total of 15 points had a 1 in 34 chance of being drawn. For nonresidents, the odds increased from 1 in 359 overall to 1 in 164 for applicants with 15 points.

The Stevens Boys basketball team played two games this past week, hosting the Wildcats of Fall Mountain on Tues-

The Wildcats would prevail in an exciting contest as they held on for a 66-61 victory. Ethan Johnson scored a season high 17 points to pace the Cardinals. Derrick Stanhope scored 16 points, Josh Stithen added 15 points, and Owen Taylor

chipped in with 8 points. On Friday night **Plymouth** used a 23 point second quarter to go on to a 65-41 victory. Josh Stithen and Owen Taylor each tossed in 12 points apiece to lead Stevens and Tyler Bonneau had 8

points.


The junior Cardinals played their game versus Fall Mountain this past Monday, and also played the Bobcats on Friday night.


#### Look Up!

Some may be familiar with the books by Jan Caron called the Mitford Series. It is a series of books about an Episcopal priest, a bachelor about 60 when the books start and the joys, sorrows and pains of being a priest in a rural parish. The author develops each character so that they seem like your neighbors and friends.

In the third book which is named "Light in the Window", the author develops a new relationship between Timothy, the priest, and his neighbor, Cynthia. Cynthia is a writer/illustrator of children's books.

The little town of Mitford, North Carolina, is teeming with colorful people. One is an elderly lady called Miss Sadie. Miss Sadie is the last of a very wealthy family who have always supported the town. She has discovered an unknown half sister who had been planning a simple wedding and Miss Sadie has decided to give her a wedding to remember. Miss Sadie still lives in the family mansion which is going into disrepair, but she has decided to repair and redecorate the ball room for the wedding. She takes the pPriest into the ball room and all he can see are cracked windows, chipped pillars, mottled floors where rain has



leaked and the general disrepair of the furnishings. Miss Sadie sees his look and reads his mind and says to him, "You haven't looked up even once! People keep their nose to the ground when they ought to be looking up!" When Timothy turns his gaze upward, he is in awe of the ornate clouds, cherubs and angels all flying upward toward the center in a beautiful pattern.

Miss Sadie is right! We do look down more that we look upward. Why is that? How could it be that we are so aware of the earth below us and not so much the beauty of what is above. Are we so seeking to be so grounded that we can't lift our eyes from the pathway of life and seek the beauty from above? We've had some awesome sunsets this winter. It is the light from above that makes them so beautiful. When we look down we see ground, grass, asphalt. We see what holds us to the ground. It's difficult to get airborne when all we see is ground and our minds stay grounded. When we look down we stay where we are. There is no incentive to do anything more exciting than watch where our feet are. As a result, we never get to climb beyond our limitations. As a result we never get to see the Eagles soar, the butterfly migrate, the geese seeking their winter home. We never get to see the clouds where angels dwell or the stars and planets that shine upon our world.

The world remains, dull and colorless. We cherish beauty, in fact we crave beauty! There is such beauty all around us, but when we keep our eyes lowered, we miss the beauty of the birds, then bees, then clouds and soon they become object that we can't recognize as beautiful because we lose our focus and awareness of beauty until we can no longer see it.

So, look up, friends. Look up and find the beauty of the world.


