Fellows Completes Perfect Season Friday at Claremont; Greenslit and Templeton also Win to Clinch Titles

CLAREMONT, NH— Aaron Fellows completed an historic championship season Friday, September 13, winning his 16th consecutive Late Model Sportsman feature race at Claremont Motorsports Park to finish undefeated in main event competition during the 2019 racing season at the storied third-mile speedplant.

And while the 40-year-old star was busy punctuating his 12th championship season with Friday's win, both Dave Greenslit and Kyle Templeton had plenty to celebrate too. Greenslit topped the season-finale Street Stock feature to win his own track crown, while Templeton also earned a victory lap en route to his first Pure Stock title.

Seabrook's Adam Knowles topped the Six-Shooters, winning his second event in as many tries at the Thrasher Road oval. Bay Stater D.J. Flanagan was the night's Red Neck Enduro winner, and Seabrook's Ed Flanagan – piloting the same Monte Carlo he's campaigned since 2001 – was victorious in the eight-cylinder Enduro.

Ryan Bell led the first 17 laps of the R.E. Hinkley Late Model Sportsman main event, with Fellows, who'd dropped Robert Hagar to third two circuits earlier, then using his trademark low dive into turn one to take command and then dart off to history, completing his remarkable season a full third-lap ahead of Hagar.

With Hagar impressive in second, Ben Poland charged back from a lap-11 looper to finish third on the night and second on the summer.

Poland's own 2019 successes included 14 podium finishes in 16 events, including nine runner-up outings, one an early-season near miss in which Fellows' motor grenaded on the last lap, holding on just long enough to allow him to coast to the awaiting checkers. Hagar had four second-place finishes, including runner-up showings in each of season's final three events.

Greenslit entered Friday's season finale only



two points ahead of Chris Riendeau in the battle of two four-time feature winners for the 2019 Casella Street Stock crown. On this night, Greenslit came well prepared.

Blasting off from row two, the hometown hot shoe never looked back en route to his fifth win of the summer and the championship champagne that awaited him in victory lane. Riendeau, firing from deep in the field, got up for second by lap four but could never find his way past Greenslit before heading pitside late in the event to settle for second on the summer, as he did behind Bryan Town a season ago.

Larry Riendeau took over second when his son dropped from the race, earning the night's runner-up hardware just ahead of high school junior Briana Akusis, who came back from an early-race jingle to finish third, her fourth podium finish in a row.

Like Greenslit, Templeton made easy work of topping his feature race Friday to lock up the 2019 Pure Stock championship. Last season's Rookie of The Year, Templeton's sophomore championship was earned ahead of this summer's top rookie, Bruce Adams.

Templeton hit the stripe even with Chris Carver as lap one went into the books and

then turned on the afterburners and drove away. Erin Aiken, this season's winner of the Cody LaFont Memorial twin bill, was strong in second, with Newport's Jim Carley, strong again, finishing both third on the night and third on the year.

Sea-coaster Adam Knowles took over when Six-Shooter regular Paul Colburn's race-leading ride faltered half way through the night's 30-lapper. With Knowles scoring his second win of the season, Six-Shooter champ Jeremy Blood – who entered Friday's race with the 2019 title already in hand – came home third on the night to conclude his 11-win championship season.

The CMP Pepsi Sportsman Modifieds did not compete in the track's final 2019 event, having completed their schedule two weeks earlier. Sunapee pilot Brian Robie is the track champion in that division, joining Fellows, Greenslit, Templeton, and Blood as the 2019 champions of their division. Like both Templeton and Blood, Robie's track title is his first.

Cardinals blanked by Cougars, 2-0

The Stevens boys varsity soccer team stood listening to coach Jason Stone after Friday's 2-0 loss to the Kearsage Cougars.

"You played well, but not aggressively enough," said Stone. "You have to win the ball, then pass it to your teammates. Play more offense."

The boys took in the lesson, packed up their gear and trudged across the field to waiting family and friends.

Stone observed, "We're getting really good at playing D [defense], but that's because we play so much of it. When I say we have to win the ball, I mean that instead of standing and waiting to see where it might land, go right in for it. Attack it, even before it hits the ground."

He was also matter-of-fact about the Cougars' close-in first goal. "It was everybody's fault. The ball was right in the goalie's

box. He should have fallen on it. Defense should have been tougher keeping it away from the box."

The Cardinals' defense paid off in the first half, which ended 0-0. But their offense still needs work. "The guys are getting too used to winning the ball but then immediately passing it to one player. They expect him to take it all the way to the goal. They have to get better at playing as a team. More aware of each other, more passing."

Stone also noted, "Part of the problem is that we can't sub like other teams. We just don't have the numbers. So of course they're exhausted. Tonight it looked like we had the numbers, but that's because I put in some of the JV players."

The Cardinals are now 1-4 for the season. Their next home game is 6 p.m. Monday, Sept. 23, vs John Stark Regional High School.

ing rivals the Newport Tigers. As expected it was an exciting, hard fought, and intense game with the visiting Tigers taking home the Chamber Challenge Cup with a 26-18 win.

Both teams started quickly as Newport would score on their opening possession on a Darshawn Chesser 5 yard touchdown run. The kick was good and it was 7-0 Tigers. Stevens would answer on their ensuing drive, marching downfield and capping the drive on a 3 yard touchdown run by Keaghan McAllister. The two point conversion failed and it was 7-6. The game would stay that way until the Cardinals scored on the first play of the 2nd quarter, with McAllister again scoring the touchdown, this time on a 1 yard run. Newport would thwart the two point conversion try and it was 12-7 Stevens. The touchdown was set up by a fumble recovery on the kickoff after the first Stevens score. Keegan Batchelder knocked the ball loose with Matt Jones pouncing on the loose pigskin.

Newport would get a big turnover late in the half, recovering a fumble deep in Stevens territory. Marius Edwards connected with Bryce Willey for a 27 yard touchdown to give Newport the lead. The extra point failed and it was 13-12 Newport at the half.

Stevens would take the lead back on their first drive of the 3rd quarter as Owen Taylor connected with Lucas Mudge on a 34 yard

catch and run. Stevens was stopped for the 3rd time on the extra point and it was 18-13 heading into the final quarter.

Newport came up with two huge turnovers, both resulting in touchdowns to earn the come from behind victory and take the Chamber Challenge Cup back to Newport. The first came when Josh Sharron stepped in front of a pass to pick it off and returned it untouched 34 yards for the go ahead touchdown. The conversion attempt was blocked and it was 19-18 Tigers. After the Cardinals stopped the Tigers

on a 4th down play, the Cardinals took over near midfield but Devyn Heino picked up a fumble, on a big sack, and returned it 40 yards for the touchdown. Edwards kick was good and it put Newport up 26-18. Stevens would have one last chance to try and score and get the two point conversion to tie, but Newport recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and took a knee to earn a big Division III win.

The game between Coach **Proper and Coach** Silva's teams was a physical back and forth game but both teams kept their composure throughout the game with both teams, and rivals in all sports, displaying the sportsmanship and respect that high school sports should be all about.

Newport will travel to Campbell next Saturday.




Inspiration

Robert Frost

A million hearts broke and tears formed in many eyes when the beloved American Poet, Robert Frost, faltered and was unable to read a poem which he had written for John F. Kennedy's inauguration on January 20, 1961. Robert Frost, 86, seemed to be confused, but with dignity and presence of mind he repeated from memory, a poem he had written decades earlier. It was a cold, sunny, windy day and he just couldn't see the manuscript.

Superficially, Frost's poems tell simple stories; "Stopping By the Woods", "The Road Not Taken", "Mending Wall", are three of the most remembered poems. Many of us from the generations who memorized poems in school, can still repeat all or at least some of the lines. Superficially, these poems tell about country life, it's simplicity, it's gentleness. We've all, probably taken time to watch the snow fall. Sometimes, sitting on the porch, sometimes watching out a window. We sit and watch with a kind of wonder as snow first covers the ground with a white, wooly blanket. Then, as time moves on we watch the snow creep up a fence maybe wondering how we'll go on through the impenetrable forest. However, there is more than stopping to watch the woods fill up with snow. It is a story of perseverance, where rather than go into the woods and submit to the cold and snow, we move on with our life facing the joys and sorrows. We put on our coats, boots, hats and mittens and shovel in hand, we clear the driveway in preparation for another day!



"Mending Wall" has a broader scope. While the idea of "good fences make good neighbors" is true, we need to look deeper into the reason. Some build walls to separate themselves from

their neighbor, in an attempt at seclusion, maybe. Others build walls as a clear demarcation of what is yours and what is mine. In either case, this poem advocates to meet your neighbor at a specific place and walking along the wall together, replacing the stones together. Who knows why this or that stone has fallen to your or my side, the fact is, the stone needs to be replaced so that we know the line that keeps us friends! As we walk the line together, we talk about the winter gone by, the spring emerging. We talk about hopes and dreams and many other things. In cold New England where neighbor's don't see each other through the winter, mending walls mends friendships too!

Think of the differences we could make in the world if we just had the opportunity to walk and work together with those whom we think are different, even strange. If we could focus on a job, a task, rather than a policy; if we could cooperate on a project, rather than destroy or denigrate someone else's project wouldn't we all be happier?

Why who knows what we could accomplish with such positive attitudes! We might even find peace! Peace in our hearts! Peace in our neighborhoods! Peace in our country! Peace in the world.
